

## ASSESSMENTS Historical

Peppermint Grove Tennis Club Pavilion was built on land that was originally Edward Keane's cow paddock. In 1899 the land was purchased by the Crown and created into a public park. The reserve and pavilion were created as places of public enjoyment, and continue in that role. Considerable historical significance.

#### Aesthetic

The pavilion was designed in the prevailing style of the Gold Boom period residences in Peppermint Grove. The Tennis Pavilion has been well maintained and has been little adapted and has retained its original character.

#### **Technical**

The Tennis Pavilion is an accomplished design which skillfully relates style, scale and detail.

#### Social

A valuable and continuing site of Peppermint Grove social life. Considerable social significance.

#### **ENVIRONMENTAL**

Cultural Group Townscape Area

The Tennis Pavilion is within the Manners Hill Park Reserve. Manners Hill Park neighbour Keane's Point (Freshwater Bay Yacht Club).

#### Rarity

The Tennis Pavilion is one of the few remaining public pavilions in this style.

#### Representativeness

#### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This single storey timber framed and tile roofed Pavilion, in the Federation Queen Anne style, has cultural significance because:

- the Park and its Pavilion have been established for a century and, for most of the history of Peppermint Grove, have been a social and recreational focus for the suburb:
- the Park and Pavilion have considerable historical and social significance;
- the Pavilion is a comparatively rare examples of public pavilion of this period;
- the park has associations with Keane and Sir J J Talbot Hobbs.

## ASSESSMENTS Historical

Neil McNeil, a leading industrialist, was one of the first five people to establish themselves in Peppermint Grove. The original McNeil holding occupied the whole streetblock from The Esplanade to Stirling Highway, north of McNeil Street, which was named for the family. The McNeils were important members of Perth and Peppermint Grove society, The Cliffe was a notable venue for garden parties with its extensive gardens and cliffside setting overlooking Fresh Water Bay. The McNeils held Red Cross meetings to prepare garments to send to soldiers overseas during World War I. The McNeils remained a part of the Peppermint Grove community for a quarter of a century. After the World War I the extensive McNeil holding was subdivided, with lots facing McNeil Street. The place has been owned for the past decade by Mark Creasey, a notable mineral prospector. Exceptional historical significance.

Aesthetic

The Cliffe has been described as 'the showpiece for the local timber industry...a 30-room honeycomb of jarrah' (Pascoe p 57). Externally J J Talbot Hobbs used a restrained Federation Arts and Crafts style, which has been muted with blander decoration. Internally the house has finely proportioned Edwardian interiors, 'MacIntosh' inspired Art Nouveau bedroom suite, original bathrooms and large kitchen, for lavish entertainment.

**Technical** 

The Cliffe demonstrates the skilled use of the several architectural lexicons of the day. It is an exemplar of its time because of the high level of authenticity.

Social

The Cliffe was a focus for Perth and Peppermint Grove society during the first quarter of this century. The history of the McNeil holding reflects the suburb's social development. Considerable social significance.

Environmental
Cultural Group

The Cliffe and its grounds are a cultural group in their own right, whilst the subdivision of the McNeil holding now contains a group of significant InterWar residences.

Rarity

The Cliffe remains a rarity of a mansion constructed almost wholly in timber, in the form of a large bungalow.

Representativeness

The Cliffe was one of the showpieces for the use of jarrah as a fine timber.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE The Cliffe is one of the most significant places of its period in Western Australia with exceptional historic, aesthetic, technical and social significance.

Historical

Herbert Foulds was one of Western Australia's principal manufacturers in the 1920s and 1930s. His ownership gives the place historic significance.

Aesthetic

The place was designed as a Federation period bungalow, complete with detailing of that period, eg. the chimneys. The roof appears to have been modified by the elimination of separate or crippled verandahs, which was a relatively common InterWar adaptation. The place complements other Federation period houses of the precinct.

**Technical** 

The adaptation of the place contributes to a wider understanding of the place's cultural history

Social

The place remained in the ownership of the Foulds family until 1955 and has some social significance.

- it is representative of the style and standard of the better class of bungalows in the district;
- it is located within a cultural group and a townscape area.

#### Historical

The Hubbard family has been one of the longstanding members of the Peppermint Grove community. 121 Forrest Street represents a family residence typical of the family's economic standing in the early 1900s. The place has some historical significance.

#### Aesthetic

The house is a Federation Bungalow which is asymmetrical in form and is less ornate than the Federation Queen Anne style of its neighbour. The house is finely proportioned and is notable for the elegance of its verandah with its graceful curved and fretted bressemers spanning between the turned verandah posts. The place is set in an open garden setting to the street, between places of similar style.

The carport repeats the original detail of the house, however, it confuses the original asymmetrical presentation of the house.

#### Technical

The house was a highly competent design of its style and period.

#### Social

Albert Hubbard was one of several civil servants living in this small area of Peppermint Grove in the early twentieth century. The place is part of a group reflecting the social and economic development of the suburb. The place has some social significance.



## Historical

123 Forrest Street is one of a group of residences built by merchants and senior civil servants in this part of Forrest Street in the early part of the twentieth century. The place is representative of a family residence typical of its economic standing in the early 1900s and has historical significance.

#### Aesthetic

The house is a Federation Queen Anne style which is asymmetrical in form, with a return corner positioned between projecting gables. The lively verandah is unusual in returning around the projecting gables. The house is pleasingly and robustly proportioned and is set in an open garden setting. The place sits between other places of comparable style, period and standard.

#### **Technical**

The house is a fine example of a Federation Queen Anne style, which externally has retained a high level of integrity. The design has been attributed to J J Talbot Hobbs, a notable architect of this period.

#### Social

The place is part of a group reflecting the social and economic development of the suburb. Some social significance.

#### Historical

C Gordon Piper of Fremantle firm Grieve & Piper was one of a group of merchant families who built their homes in this part of Forrest Street in the early twentieth century. The Piper family occupied 125 Forrest Street until just before the outbreak of World War II. Sir Ragnar Garrett, a Chief of Staff, also owned and occupied 125 Forrest Street. The place represents a family residence typical of its economic group in early 1900s and is of some historical significance.

#### Aesthetic

The house is a Federation Queen Anne style bungalow with an asymmetrical balance between the projecting bay and the front verandah. The house has a high degree of integrity in presenting the characteristics of its style. The place is located within an area having other places of comparable style, period and standard.

#### **Technical**

The place is a relatively intact example of a Federation Queen Anne style of bungalow.

#### Social

The place is part of a group reflecting the social and economic development of the suburb, which has some social significance.

#### Environmental

Cultural Group Townscape Area Part of a cultural group

The place is located within a townscape area

#### Rarity

The place is a fine example of a Federation Queen Anne style bungalow and may be closer to its original character than most places in the district.

- it is part of a cultural group and is located within a townscape area.



#### Historical

The place was established by W Quirk and after 1940 was owned and occupied by Sir Lawrence Jackson, Chief Justice. The place at 127 Forrest Street represents a family residence typical of the family's economic standing in the early 1900s, which was attractive in later times for persons of position and, therefore, has some historical significance.

#### Aesthetic

The place is basically Federation Georgian in style, however, the tall double hung windows are more characteristic of Federation Bungalows than the Colonial Georgian period and style. The style is complementary to the neighbouring places in the precinct.

#### Technical

In stylistic terms the place is basically a style from a previous period.

#### Social

Part of a group reflecting the social and economic development of the suburb. Some social significance.

## Environmental

## Historical

The house was one of a group of places built by merchants and prominent citizens in the late nineteenth/early twentieth century. Later the place was owned and occupied by Walter and Alison Saw, between 1930 & 1970. The place has some historical significance.

#### Aesthetic

The house is a Federation Queen Anne style bungalow which now forms an annexe to a large addition to the rear. The front part of the original house remains intact, with little adaptation. The place is within a precinct of other places of comparable, style, period and standard.

#### **Technical**

The place retains the Federation Queen Anne style of the original bungalow and provides continuity of the precinct.

#### Social

The place is part of a precinct reflecting the social and economic development of the suburb and, therefore, has some social significance.

#### Environmental

#### Historical

This mansion was constructed for James Sharpe, pastoralist, and reflects the large households typical of this part of Peppermint Grove in the pre-World War I period. The house was later owned by successful manufacturers, Plaistowe and Hamilton. The place has considerable historical significance.

#### Aesthetic

This handsome mansion has retained most of its integrity externally and is one of the finest two storey dwellings in the district. The place is a cornerstone of the Forrest Street west cultural heritage group & townscape precinct. Smypathic restoration and additions by I & S Trahar

#### Technical

The place is an examplar of the Federation Filigree style, where the lightness and elegance of the cast iron verandahs, effectively contrasts and enlivens the large brick and tile mass of the house.

#### Social

Later owners Hugh Plaistowe and the Hamilton family both belong to the influx of successful manufacturers and merchants to Peppermint Grove in the interwar period.

- the place is an integral part of a cultural group and townscape area.

## ASSESSMENTS Historical

The original residence, 'Bellevue', was an early and typical single storey limestone bungalow built in Peppermint Grove around the turn of the century. The place is associated with prominent businessmen, as it belonged originally to Sidney Emanuel, (a business partner of Alexander Forrest). Later, between 1950 and 1960 'Bellevue' belonged to D.R.A Gair, of the Orient Steamship company, who represented the new wave of mercantile elite who came into Peppermint Grove in the 1950's. Some historical significance.

Aesthetic

The original Federation Queen Anne residence was a notable early example of its style, which has been visually overborne by a large extension.

**Technical** 

Much of the original residence is intact with a moderate/high degree of integrity.

Social

The original house and its extension demonstrate the changing space standards of different generations, for prominent business families.

## ASSESSMENTS Historical

The site has some historical significance through its associations with Bert Meecham, a prominent Inter War businessman, and the Bell family, who are prominent business people. Mrs Bell is the daughter of Ric New, Perth's legendary Post World War II brick maker.

#### Aesthetic

The residence is an accomplished essay in the Revival Italianate style, exhibiting a skilled application of the canons of the style, adapted to contemporary standards of accommodation. Its grandness is complemented by the rising garden with its formal plantings.

#### Technical

The residence is one of the few Post World War II mansions that demonstrates a comprehensive knowledge and application of the canons of the revivalist style to contemporary application, through its use of symmetrical organisation and massing and the consistent application of an appropriate proportioning system. It is a late work of Marshall Clifton, one of the more important architects to have practised in Peppermint Grove.

The redevelopment of this property was a forerunner to further redevelopments in the suburb arising from the Mineral Boom period and the surge engendered in the state's economy.

The land was originally owned by Sir Walter Hartwell James, a prominent barrister, former State Premier 1902-1904, founding partner of legal company Stone James & Partners, later Attorney General and Chancellor of UWA. The residence was constructed for Constance Miller, a member of the well known Miller family, active member over many years in the All Saint's and St Luke's church parishes and the Girls' Friendly Society. The association with Constance Miller spanned the period 1924 - 1967.

Aesthetic

The residence is an example of the transition in style from the Federation Bungalow to the InterWar Californian Bungalow, which sits comfortably close to the ground and presents as a comfortable home of its period.

## ASSESSMENTS

Historical

This was the fourth residence to be built in Peppermint Grove, for James McBean, one of the first families to move to Peppermint Grove and typical of the larger estates with landscaped grounds and stables. Owned 1920 to 1945/50 by Walter James Waldie Forbes, Architect of the firm Hobbs, Smith and Forbes. Forbes designed Elders Woolstores in Fremantle and the Orient buildings. Considerable historical significance.

Aesthetic

This single storey residence with dormered attic is a late example of the Regency style in Perth, at the beginning of the Gold Boom period of development, with its more exuberant styles. The elegant verandah is particularly noteworthy. The property also contains a notable shingle roofed stables from the period. **Technical** 

This residence is an accomplished and elegant example of the Regency style, apart from the dormer, which emphasises a misfit between the roof form and the symmetry of the façade.

The Royal Freshwater Bay Yacht Club was formed as a 'Boating Club' in 1896, and became a 'yacht club' in 1903, the club received its Royal Charter in 1934. In 1936 the club moved to the Keane's old residence on Keane's point, and the boat sheds were transported across the bay to their present position. The Yacht Club was a popular institution among Peppermint Grove residents and had a junior division for the local youth. Many of the stalwart members of the Peppermint Grove, such as Chief Justice McMillan and William Evans, held key positions in the club. Considerable historical significance.

Aesthetic

The boatsheds are straightforward examples of their genre, but made more picturesque by their grouping and being located on the well lit southern foreshore.

**Technical** 

The boatsheds are unusual in having been relocated from another nearby site. This probably meant that the piled footings were renewed at that time.

## Historical

The Presbyterian church hall was constructed c.1896, as the first church facility in the suburb. It served a double purpose as it was also used for education purposes, as there was no other facility available for schooling in the area. The Cottesloe State School held its classes in the hall until their own building was completed in 1898. Both the Presbyterian and Anglican denominations held their services in the hall. The Anglican congregation held their church services there until St Luke's Church was built in Mosman Park in 1897. The manse was constructed in 1905. St. Columba's Church was erected in 1909. It is the only Protestant Church in the suburb. The hall was retained and has been used ever since. The Church and Hall have considerable historical significance.

#### Aesthetic

St Columba's Church is a fine essay in the Gothic Revival style of the period. Internally it is a single unitary space, of relatively conventional Gothic proportions, neatly detailed, with a rather stumpy crenellated tower at its north east corner. The squat nature of the tower makes it unlikely that it was ever intended to have a spire.

The hall is a straightforward utilitarian structure relatively unadorned and non-specific in its layout and detailing to be as multi-functional as possible.

# Technical Social

The church and hall provided the first spiritual, social and educational facilities for the suburb and are fundamental elements in the spiritual, educational and social history of the suburb. Considerable social significance.

# Environmental Cultural Group Townscape Area

The church, hall and manse form a cultural group.

The church is a major townscape element in the west Keane Street townscape area.

The hall was the first venue available in the suburb for worship, educational and social uses.

The Cottesloe Police Station was officially opened in May 1900. Police then patrolled the areas of Cottesloe, Peppermint Grove and Buckland Hill, on foot, by bicycle or on horseback. It was an important amenity for the district until the end of the 1980s Considerable historical significance. Now used by Blackwell & Associates landscape architects as their office.

## Aesthetic

The place is a pleasing, if austere, example of its style and period, befitting a local police station of the time.



## Historical

Occupied c.1935 to c.1950 by the Cottesloe branch of the Women's Service Guild, a feminist organisation of national and local importance. Bessie Rischbeith, of View Street, Peppermint Grove, herself a leading feminist, was one of the Women's Service Guild founding members in 1909. Edith Cowan was initially on the Executive of the Guild, as was Elizabeth Clapham, the first woman elected to a political institution in Western Australia (she was elected to the Town Council of Cottesloe in 1920, a year before Edith Cowan became the first woman member of Parliament). Bessie Rischbeith was an Australian delegate to the Assembly of the League of Nations. Rischbeith's sister, another Peppermint Grove resident, Olive Evans, was President of the Cottesloe branch. Owned since 1955 by Jacob Zeffert. Exceptional historical significance.

## Aesthetic

A single storey Gold Period shop rebuilt as an InterWar shop/house as part of a strip retail group, characteristic of strip retailing on other major traffic routes in the Perth region, eg. Bassendean and Victoria Park.

## **Technical**

The Interwar shop/house was a simple, flexible building type readily adapted to a variety of service and retailing purposes. Highway fronting properties were subject to modifications to satisfy new traffic safety requirements.

## Social

Considerable social significance as the site of one of the leading feminist organisations in Australia.



## Historical

Between 1915 and 1940, 490-494 Stirling Highway was used as an electricity supply station, at first by the Cottesloe Municipal Council, then after 1935 by the State Government. Since then it has functioned as strip retailing. Some historical significance.

## Aesthetic



# ASSESSMENTS Historical

The place was the first permanent state school to be established in the area. The school was opened officially in 1898 with a roll of 208 children. Fees were 6d for every child over 12 years and 3d for every child under 12. State school fees were abolished in 1899. The school underwent two further stages of development until 1910. The school has had a number of notable headmasters and several former pupils have gone on to distinguished careers in education. It continues to serve as a Primary School. Pupils at the school have included, Dame Rachel Cleland (Evans). Exceptional historical significance.

## Aesthetic

The place is a landmark due to its prominent location on Stirling Highway and its pleasing design. It is a good example of the ambitious style of architecture following from gold based prosperity by George Temple Poole one of Western Australia's finest architects.

## Technical

The place is attractive, harmonious, well proportioned and coherent building which has skillfully welded two similar, but differing styles. The first stage was designed by George Temple Poole in a characteristic Free Classical style, whilst the western additions are more in the standardised school designs, using a subdued Arts & Crafts style.

## Social

The school is associated with the development of education in the suburb, and such cultural activities as the compulsory military cadet scheme and the introduction of Australian Rules football as a school sport at the turn of the twentieth century. Considerable social significance.

# Environmental Townscape Area Representativeness

The place is a landmark element to a busy thoroughfare.

The place is representative of the standards of state school design of the time, however, the design is more distinguished than most state schools of the period.

# STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The brick, limestone, render and iron single storeyed school building, in the Federation Free Style/Arts & Crafts styles, has cultural significance because:

- it has exceptional historical associations with the local community, the education community and distinguished public and political figures:
- it is one of the most distinguished state school designs of its period;
- it is representative of the standard and facilities of available public education;



Historical

In 1914 Scotch College was given permission by the Peppermint Grove Roads Board to erect a private boatshed on the foreshore, one of only a small number allowed. It is now one of only 2 private boatsheds on the foreshore remaining from the era of the Roads Board. Considerable historical significance.

Aesthetic

The boatshed is a straightforward example of its genre, functional rather than decorative in appearance.

**Technical** 

The life of boatsheds of this type is usually governed by the condition of the timber piles on which it is constructed. The condition of the piles is not known.

Social

A large number of Peppermint Grove boys attended Scotch College in Claremont, and the boatshed has played a significant role in the lives of many local children and their families. Considerable social significance.

# **Environmental** Cultural Group Townscape Area

Rarity

Boatsheds located on foreshores are becoming increasingly rare due to planning constraints and the difficulty of prolonging the structural life of structures based on piled footings.

Representativeness

The form of the boatshed is typical of boatshed constructions from this period.

## STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The weatherboard and galvanised iron boatshed, in Federation vernacular style, has cultural significance because:

- it is one of only two boatsheds erected on the foreshore during the period of the Roads Board;
- it is one of an increasingly rare number of boatsheds, from this period, still extant of Perth's foreshore;
- it has played a large role in the lives of many local children and their families, giving it considerable social significance.



Historical

One of a group of early prestige bungalows built in the year of Federation. Robert Fairbairn was a Police Magistrate and longstanding member of the Peppermint Grove community. The residence was later owned by Mr & Mrs Foulkes-Taylor, successful merchants in the post World War II period. Considerable significance.

Aesthetic

A comparatively plain bungalow of its period, handsomely proportioned, conservative in colour and decoration, with decorative elements confined to gable and chimneys. Extended in sympathetic character with loft clerestorey utilising Arts & Crafts detailing.

**Technical** 

The original house was an accomplished design from the office of Hobbs Smith & Forbes and is one of several notable places designed by the practice. It has been extended in character into a much larger house.

Social

The place has long term associations with the Fairbairn & Foulkes-Taylor families, who have been significant members of the Peppermint Grove community.

Environmental Cultural Group

Part of a group, with the neighbouring property at 6 The Esplanade, formerly owned by the Fairbairn family.

Townscape Area

Rarity Representativeness

The place is representative of a relatively modest early house associated with a public servant during the gold boom period and expanded into a much larger house suitable for successful business families.

# STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This single storey limestone, timber and iron residence, in the Federation Queen Anne Bungalow style, has cultural significance because:

- it is of considerable historical significance because of its associations with the Fairbairn and Foulkes-Taylor families;
- it is an accomplished example of a modest family house which has been extended sympathetically into a much larger house;
- it is a relatively intact example from the turn of the 20<sup>th</sup> century.

# ASSESSMENTS Historical

The residence was constructed prior to World War I and was one of the string of large Federation Queen Anne bungalows constructed along The Esplanade. Since its construction it has changed hands each generation.

## Aesthetic

The residence is now a much adapted elevated bungalow formerly in the Federation Queen Anne bungalow style. Its prominent elevated diagonal verandah demonstrates that the view across Freshwater Bay to Keane's Point was possibly more valued than the wider view along the Swan River.





The place was built c.1900 for Augustus Roe, Police Magistrate. Augustus Roe was the youngest son of Perth's first Surveyor General John Septimus Roe. The place remained in the Roe family for 65 years until purchased by the Cullitys. Considerable historical significance.

Aesthetic

The residence is one of the finest, most handsome, large bungalows constructed along the Peppermint Grove foreshore, during the Gold Boom period. It is one of the landmarks of Peppermint Grove.

Technical

The residence is one of the finest designs of Olsen and Sanders and is an exemplar of its style, which retains a high level of integrity

Social

The Esplanade was the chosen location of many of Western Australia's bureaucratic elite, which included Augustus Roe. Considerable social significance.

Environmental

Cultural Group

The place forms part of a group at the lower end of The Esplanade.

Townscape Area

The place forms part of a precinct at the lower end of The Esplanade and Manners Hill Park.

Rarity

Few places of the style and period are as fine or retain such a high level of integrity.

Representativeness

# ASSESSMENTS Historical

Built c.1905 as the Presbyterian Manse. The Presbyterians were the first to establish a church in the suburb. They commenced meeting in 1896 in a timber church hall, facing Keane Street. The construction of the manse reflects the need for a full time minister to serve the area, The manse has some historical significance in its own right, however its historical significance is greater as part of a cultural group.

## Aesthetic

The place is an attractive cottage of its style and period, although the adapted roof and gable detract from its visual impact. The rusticated limestone walling matches the neighbouring St Columba's Church which was constructed four years after the manse was constructed.

Significant in its role as the Presbyterian manse, supporting the activity of the Presbyterian parish and its role in the religious and social life of the suburb. Some social significance.

# ASSESSMENTS Historical

The place was built by the Rischbeith family who were to become one of Peppermint Grove's enduring families. 5 View Street is one of a group of mansions built at the influx of wealthy settlers to Peppermint Grove. It is now the largest remaining mansion in Peppermint Grove. Henry Rischbeith was the founder of Henry Wills & Co, one of WA's major companies during the Gold Boom period. Bessie Rischbeith was one of Perth's leading activists and public speakers in the Western Australian women's movement and the Women's Service Guild. She is included among those who persuaded Premier John Forrest to withdraw his opposition to the female franchise in 1899. During the 1930s she was an Australian delegate to the Assembly of the League of Nations. Exceptional historical significance.

## Aesthetic

The original mansion had a sweeping drive, a 98-ft well, a fern-house, tennis court, stables, other outhouses and housed an outstanding collection of seventeenth and eighteenth century English furniture. "Unalla" was one of the major residences designed by the prominent architect Charles Oldham. Oldham and Hobbs established the character of the major residences of the suburb and of the Perth region. Considerable aesthetic significance.

## Technical

"Unalla" and the other major residences constructed in Peppermint Grove at the time, effectively established the Western Australian characteristics of the Federation Queen Anne and Federation Bungalow styles. Considerable technical significance.

## Social

This site reflects the attraction of the nascent Peppermint Grove for the newly successful business people of the Gold Boom period, and an important phase in the social development of the suburb. Considerable social significance.

## Environmental



# ASSESSMENTS Historical

The residence was built by Auguste Stang, who was Norwegian Consul at the time. The place was bought in 1920, by Adam Baird. Adam was a successful mining engineer and manufacturer on the eastern goldfields, who volunteered his services to Britain during WWI. Returning to Perth the Adam Baird family then became a well-established Peppermint Grove family, with Adam Baird being director of Plaimar Ltd and Baird's and a Councillor of PLC. (The place was subdivided to form 9A on the south side and another house, designed by Marshall Clifton, was built there in 1960 for Baird's two daughters, Alison and Kathleen.) Considerable historical significance.

## Aesthetic

The residence is an accomplished, but comparatively subdued, example of the Federation Queen Anne style, which retains its original form and palette of materials.

## **Technical**

## Social

As the home of a consul and later as the home of a successful manufacturer the place demonstrates residents of the first two major phases of the suburb's development. The Baird sisters, who died in 1998 & 2000, were a great assistance to Presbyterian Ladies College in looking after boarders stranded by the 2<sup>nd</sup> World War during their Christmas and term holidays. They were notable for botany and for leadership of Red Cross and Girl Guides.

- it has considerable historical significance as it was originally associated with Auguste Stang, the Norwegian Consul of the time, and later had a long association with the Adam Baird family, including his daughters Alison and Kathleen;



# Historical

Harold Percy Farmaner was an accountant at the General Post Office, who bought the block in View Street in 1893. The house was built some time before 1900. Farmaner was part of the group of high level civil servants who, along with a handful of pastoralists and wealthy merchants were responsible for establishing Peppermint Grove as a suburb in the late nineteenth century. Catherine Mary Cameron purchased the property from Farmaner, or his estate, in the mid 1950s and it has remained in her ownership since. Of considerable historical significance.

# Aesthetic

A comparatively plain bungalow of its period reflecting its pre Gold Boom origins, constructed to a relatively standard house plan of the day. The simplicity of design shows it to be one of the oldest surviving residences of the district.



# ASSESSMENTS Historical

The place was owned, developed and occupied between 1905 and 1925 by Captain Arundel, a prominent surveyor and ship's captain. After 1925, 28 View Street was owned by Sir Eric and Kathleen Sandover. Sir Eric Sandover was a highly successful Western Australian businessman, and one among the influx of such men into Peppermint Grove in the 1920's. Kathleen Sandover was a political activist. In the 1950's, the house was bought by another successful businessman H. V Reilly and his wife Mavis. The next owner, Rodney Evans was a very successful Accountant with the firm Melson, Wilson and Evans. Considerable historical significance.

## Aesthetic

The place is an attractive example of a large bungalow, built in two linked wings, which is planned with major rooms facing the street, including the projecting octagonal north room. The restraint of the design is belied by the light, rhythmic verandah.

## **Technical**

The residence is a well resolved design which integrates a number of dissimilar elements with its continuous verandah, having a rhythmic combination of double posts and widespan latticed bressemer. It retains a high level of integrity.

## Social

The place has been associated with successful business families and has been associated with social and political activity in the district.

# Environmental Cultural Group Townscape Area

The place is comparatively rare due to the intactness of its exterior.

## Representativeness

The single storey limestone bungalow was a relatively widespread building form for a prestigious residences of the period.

- it is a place of recognized social significance.

## Historical

The house has been owned by a number of well known Peppermint Grove personalities. Throughout its history the place has consistently changed its ownership, with a new owner on average each decade.

## Aesthetic

The place is basically symmetrical with its major face addressing the street frontage. The house is dominated by its strong roof form with its striking twin gables and crippled verandah, continuous with the main roof. It is a strong presence in the streetscape.

## **Technical**

The house is simple and relatively plain with the gables being the main decorative elements. The place is unusual in its broad address of the street and its reliance on symmetry and proportion. The impact of the terra cotta tile and red brick balanced against the almost abstract patterns of verandah, gables and chimney has been diminished with the rendering of the face brickwork.

The place is valued for its associations with its various owners and its designer Sir J J Talbot Hobbs.

# ASSESSMENTS Historical

'St Just' was built c.1911 for Richard Strelitz, a successful businessman, and his wife Bessie. During WW1 Strelitz was interned by authorities, and was accused of signalling enemy ships at sea. After the war, 'St Just' was sold to William Forrest, son of Alexander Forrest. 'St Just' remained in the Forrest family until c.1943. A single storey detached groom come gardener's cottage (2 room cottage) in the south western corner of the site. It is an outstanding example of a Peppermint Grove mansion. Exceptional historical significance.

## Aesthetic

'St Just' is a prominently located and remarkably intact example of a Federation Queen Anne style mansion, exuberant, picturesque and controlled into a grand and unified architectural work, which addresses its setting.

#### **Technical**

'St Just' is an exemplar of its style, Federation Queen Anne, and a notable example of the exuberance of the style being used with the technical control necessary for the coherent expression of a mansion. The place retains a high level of integrity and a high degree of authenticity.

#### Social

The place was built for formal entertainment and was once a notable place for social events. Among the myriad rooms of 'St Just' were a ballroom, a smoking room, dining room, drawing room, a marbled floored entrance hall and six bedrooms.

# Environmental Cultural Group Townscape Area

## Rarity

Mansions of this style and quality are rare in Perth and WA.

## Representativeness

'St Just' is representative of the suburb's attraction to the powerful, the entrepreneurial and the wealthy.



# **ASSESSMENTS** Historical

This large two storey residence was built for R.F McMillan, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court and Lieutenant Governor. The McMillan family were valued members of the Peppermint Grove community and remained at 47 View Street until c.1955. Considerable historical significance.

## Aesthetic

The place is an imposing two storey corner residence, which formed part of the street block which was largely the bailiwick of Sir J J Talbot Hobbs and his estate. This residence shows some of the then preoccupations, of the Hobbs office, towards imposing and carefully proportioned alternatives to the Queen Anne style.

## Technical

The residence is imposing, whilst being transitional in style, between a revival Georgian style and the contemporary Arts and Crafts style. Early photographs show the eastern façade of the residence to have been more resolved in its design than is evident now in the street facades. It retains a moderate/high level of integrity.

# Social

The place reflects part of the social makeup and social development of the suburb and has long associations with the McMillan family.

# Environmental Cultural Group Townscape Area

The place is a major townscape element at the south end of View Street.

## Rarity

The place is a stylistic rarity because of its strong Georgian Revival flavour.

## Representativeness

Places developed for senior legal figures in the suburb have eschewed the picturesque in favour of the plain and the dignified. This place is representative of that predisposition of the legal fraternity.

#### Historical

The bungalow is believed to be the first permanent residence in Peppermint Grove. Sayer purchased twelve blocks from the Peppermint Grove syndicate. Sayer was a valued member of the Peppermint Grove community. Considerable historical significance.

#### Aesthetic

The place is constructed in a style consistent with the very early Gold Boom development period, before Federation styles became the norm. The style is most consistent with Late Colonial Georgian house patterns, although the dominant roof form makes it more akin to early Georgian building forms.

## Technical

The place retains a moderate/high level of integrity.

Reflects the social development of the suburb. Considerable social significance.
