In last year's July edition of PepTalk, I advised that the Shire had adopted a Public Tree Management Strategy. The Strategy aims to ensure that Peppermint Grove retains its treasured leafy green streetscapes through sound management of all trees on public land. However, many local governments in the metropolitan area are concerned over the loss of mature trees on privately owned land. Much of the decline in tree canopy cover is a result of infill development on small lots. Whilst this form of development is not prevalent in the Shire, we do often see the loss of mature trees when older houses are demolished. and new development occurs. Perth is predicted to become hotter and dryer in the coming decades and mature trees will be essential for

mitigating the effect of our warming climate. In the coming months, the Council will be looking at how it can work with property owners to encourage the retention of existing mature trees particularly when redevelopment occurs. We will be consulting with residents on our ideas.

The State Government has recently introduced a number of changes to local government elections and representation. A number of the changes, such as the abolition of wards for small local governments, are not applicable to the Shire. However, we will be affected by the introduction of optional preferential voting in the next local government election.

Elections will be held this year in October and I encourage all eligible residents to participate in the democratic process and vote.

As part of the Shire's Public Art opportunities, a mural is being considered on the east facing wall of the toilet block in Manners Hill Park. A workshop, hosted by the arts organisation, FORM, was recently held with interested community members and Council will consider the outcome of this before proceeding further.

May I take this opportunity to remind home owners of houses on the Shire's Heritage List, that they may be able to receive a grant for works associated with repairs or maintenance. There's more information inside this edition of PepTalk and on the Shire's website.

## **Local Heritage Conservation** Grants Scheme 2022-23


### On behalf of the local community the Shire continues to find ways of supporting the protection of our local heritage.

Conservation grant funding remains available for this financial year from the Shire to support applicants to undertake repairs and maintenance work which will conserve the heritage value of their heritage listed properties. Applicants will need to demonstrate their projects will preserve the heritage fabric of the building and contribute to the streetscape of the Shire to be eligible for the grants scheme. Eligible properties must be privately owned and on the Local Planning Scheme 4 heritage list.

This scheme is to encourage and support owners in their quest to conserve and repair their heritage property.

## **Peppermint Grove residents** support Good Sammy

The Shire of Peppermint Grove participated in a successful donation collection trial by iconic WA disability employment and training provider Good Sammy. The trial saw Good Sammy collect donations of clothing and other guality goods directly from households in our community. Good Sammy employees and volunteers delivered donation drive fliers and collection bags to homes across the Shire in November and returned to collect the generous donations the following week. Donations were taken to Good Sammy's recycling facility for sorting to identify items that could be sold in their numerous Op Shops and Online Store to help raise funds to support Western Australians with disability.

An average of 10.1kg of donations was collected from each participating household. Amongst the goods donated were high quality suits, office wear, winter clothing, handbags, jewellery and shoes.

These donations will help the environment as much as they will help Good Sammy. Through the eventual purchase and reuse of these donated items (rather than people buying equivalent items brand new) it will prevent 11,100kg of carbon dioxide being produced!

## Have you registered your furry friend?

All dogs and cats whether they live indoors or not must be registered with your local council. Registration runs from Nov 1st to 31st Oct, you can register for 1 year, 3 years or a Lifetime. As well as it being a legal requirement, having your animal registered with the Shire means we can use the information provided by you to return your best friend home if the need arises.

## **Bin tagging** 2023

The Shire is working with the Western Metropolitan Regional Council (WMRC) and the WA Local Government Association (WALGA) for their bin tagging project. The aim is to help residents put the right things in the right bin. WMRC has received funding from the Department of Water and Environmental Regulation (DWER) via WALGA to undertake bin tagging of 2000 properties across Claremont, Cottesloe, Mosman Park and Peppermint Grove. This is part of a three-year funded program and we expect the tagging to be undertaken in March for Peppermint Grove.

Bin tagging is a direct household by household education process to decrease contamination in kerbside bins. It consists of friendly Community Waste Education Officers assessing contamination levels in bins just prior to collection by lifting the lid and viewing the immediately visible contents. A tag with either a happy or sad face is then placed on the bin handle, there is space to indicate contamination types and all tags show which material should go into which bin. Bin taggers tag 100-150 bins per hour and do not look further than what is immediately visible in the bin. Rest assured, they won't be collecting any



personal information about you or your household. If you'd like to know more, please contact the WMRC on 9384 6711 or visit www.wmrc.wa.gov.au/bin-tagging for answers to common questions.

Households are visited on at least three occasions over six weeks to gauge changes in bin contamination. If any consistently severe contamination issues are found, bins are taped shut and not collected on that occasion. Experience shows that contamination decreases on repeat visits and only a handful of properties are taped.
