Shire President Karen Farley SC presented the Peppermint Grove Citizen Awards 2025. Young Citizen of the Year Award was presented to Poppy Mahon. Poppy has shown remarkable dedication and leadership in her efforts to protect owls and wildlife and raise awareness about the dangers of Second-Generation Anticoagulant Rodenticides (SGARs).

Her proactive advocacy has reached local communities, retailers, councils, and schools—educating the public on the risks these poisons pose to owls and other native species.

Poppy is an inspiring role model, not only to her peers but to the broader community. Her initiatives—such as implementing QR codes at Bunnings and conducting leaflet drops around Claremont to highlight the impact of SGARs on quendas— demonstrate her commitment to creating lasting, positive change.

Beyond her advocacy, Poppy spends her spare time in the forest alongside Dr Boyd Wykes, Conservationist for Owl Friendly Margaret River, tracking masked owls and dissecting pellets to study their diet. Her work contributes meaningfully to biodiversity and enhances community life by helping preserve our native species for future generations.

Message from the Shire President

The Minister for Planning, John Carey, has made the announcement that planning for residential development within an 800m radius of a train station will be taken out of Council hands and controlled by the WA Planning Commission (WAPC).

This loss of planning control by Council could see significant infill, higher density and height issues in a large part of the Shire. Council was working on a Local Planning Strategy (LPS) that would have seen the Shire increase density along Stirling Highway, transitioning height back from the highway. The Shire would have thereby exceeded the number of dwellings the Shire is required to meet as set by the WAPC, however this objective has been thwarted by the Minister's decision.

Council will be working with other impacted local governments and with the WA Planning Commission (WAPC) to pursue a more balanced and reasonable outcome that doesn't impact the community so severely.

Thinking about becoming a Councillor? At the close of nominations their achievements. for the Shire elections in September, sitting Councillors Hohnen and Dawkins, along with myself were elected unopposed. I was privileged to be re-elected by the Councillors as your Shire President for the next two years. One spot remains unfilled, and an extra ordinary election will be held on Thursday 26 March. I encourage anyone interested in running for Council to consider nomination.

More information on how to nominate will be made available in the new year. If you are still not sure, I encourage you to discuss what is involved in being a Shire Councillor with an

Minister's Announcement -**Cottesloe Station Precinct**

On 16 November 2025, the Minister for Planning announced that the State Government would be cutting red tape and fast-tracking housing around 10 train station precincts, including Cottesloe and Mosman Park.

The Minister announced that an improvement plan and schemes would be established up to 800m around Cottesloe Station to facilitate housing development and enhance consistency in planning and decision-making. The 800m radius around Cottesloe train station encompasses the majority of the Shire.

The improvement plans and schemes will establish the Western Australian Planning Commission (WAPC), on behalf of the State, as the responsible decision-maker that will also set the height and zoning density settings within the precinct.

The Shire encourages interested parties to register their interest in updates via the Department of Planning, Heritage and Lands (DPLH) website (external link above). All queries should be redirected towards the Precincts and Projects Team at the DPLH.

Since 2019, the Shire in partnership with the Town of Cottesloe, has been working on plans to revitalize the Cottesloe district centre, culminating in the Draft Cottesloe Village Precinct Structure Plan (CVPSP). Since April 2025, the draft CVPSP has been with the Minister for his consent to advertise and engage with Shire residents.

Specifically, the Draft CVPSP creates a modern urban planning framework to meet the projected population and economic growth of both Councils, whilst respecting the 'garden suburb' character of the Shire, that makes it a highly sort after place to live and visit.

Wattle is the 2 person meeting Pod also with sound reducing laminated glass and acoustic panels. Pending installation it will also boast a display screen with HDMI connection. Family Gaming Afternoon

This past year at The Grove Library has been a vibrant chapter of growth, discovery, and connection. We've seen record-breaking attendance at our programs, expanded junior collections and continue to foster a space where young minds feel welcome and inspired to explore.

Our library's success is powered by robust and proactive programming that caters to all age groups, from babies to pre-teens.

For our littlest readers, Baby Rhyme time sessions bring together families for song, story, and play, strengthening caregiver-child bonds and laying a foundation for early literacy.

Our story time sessions continued to be a bi-weekly highlight, with stories that transported children to new worlds and craft activities that sparked their creativity and imagination. Nearly 10,000 babies/toddlers' and their parents and carers attended the sessions this year. Our Dolphin Kids-'Ready to Read' and Trident Club cards continue to attract new generations of young readers logging their stickers and earning prizes, keeping their love for

When The Grove ran story time at the river in April we envisioned a guiet circle of maybe 20 enthusiastic kids. What we got was a fun, full-scale, 80-child attendance-glorious! But the true grand finale was the Easter Egg Hunt and bubble wand bubble blowing time. It will be back in 2026.

This competition was open to all young writers in Cottesloe, Peppermint Grove and Mosman Park, and students at local schools. Over 90 entries were received. The library also extends its hours for students only during the Exam period, which is always well attended.

Children's Book Week was a very successful event with students from kindergarten, preschool and school age children involved with the library during the course of the week. Over 800 students visited the library during the course of the week. Outreach visits continue all year reaching many hundreds of students from local schools, daycares and kindergartens.

FOGO Contamination

We've been advised by the Transfer Station Operator that 1,680 kg of contamination has been found in some FOGO bin collections.

Common contaminants included soft plastics, cardboard, and items that belong in the yellow recycling bin. To help keep our FOGO stream clean and running efficiently, we ask all residents to please review what can and cannot be placed in your FOGO bin. Thank you for doing your part to reduce contamination and support effective waste management in our community.

10c Container Exchange **Cradles and Baskets**

Container cradles and baskets have been installed on some park bins throughout the Shire to make recycling easier, they are designed to collect and store empty beverage containers for recycling.

They are often found at public locations and are part of the Containers for Change initiative, which encourages people to return their empty containers for a 10 cent refund. Only drinking vessels featuring the 10c return policy apply. The purpose of them is to reduce litter and promote recycling by allowing individuals to drop off their empty containers for collection. The collected containers are then returned to designated refund points, where they can be processed for recycling. These cradles play a crucial role in the recycling process, helping to keep materials out of landfill and supporting sustainable practices.

Peppermint Grove Residents Support Good Sammy Results

The Shire of Peppermint Grove recently took part in another donation drive in partnership with iconic WA disability employment and training provider, Good Sammy.

While there was a decline in resident participation this year compared to previous years—resulting in a lower average donation weight per household—the quality of items remained high. These generous contributions of pre-loved, resaleable goods will help avoid an estimated 5.12 tonnes of carbon dioxide emissions. All donations were delivered to Good Sammy's recycling facility, where they were carefully sorted. Items suitable for resale will be distributed across Good Sammy's network of Op Shops and Online Store, helping to raise vital funds to support Western Australians living with disability. Good Sammy extends heartfelt thanks to the residents of the Shire of Peppermint Grove for their continued generosity. Remember, reusing items is one of the most impactful ways we can all contribute to a more sustainable future.

Street Walls and Fences

Did you know that the Shire has fencing controls that requires primary street and communal street frontages to have open aspect street walls and fences.

Open aspect street fencing is one of the contributing factors to the Garden Shire narrative and ensures surveillance between the street and your home. Surveillance is one of the principles of crime prevention through environmental design and must be achieved when constructing new homes or undertaking significant redevelopment. The Shire's fencing controls also reinforce the importance of sightlines to ensure pedestrian safety. Fencing adjacent to many existing driveways, access leg and rights-of-way have not been truncated or designed to provide for pedestrian safety. Sightlines may be retrospectively required when constructing new homes or undertaking significant redevelopment. Local Planning Policy 12-Residential Fences can be found on the Shire's website under the Development Services tab and provides further detail.
